University communities begin to fight back against booster mandates

University and college communities are beginning to fight back against new orders requiring Covid 19 boosters for students.

Last week a <u>petition</u> began circulating at Boston College, a private Jesuit-run school, requesting President Fr. William Leahy to include an opt-out in a recently issued booster mandate for students who have had Covid. Boston College, like the federal government and some states, refuses to acknowledge the existence of naturally occurring immunity.

In most instances, boosters mandates are initiated by the schools, they are not required yet by federal laws or regulations, and only a few states require them.

The petition noted that the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) has not changed the definition of "fully vaccinated" to include a Covid booster, and even Anthony Fauci has labeled people who have recovered from Covid, "bullet proof" with "hybrid immunity".

Similar efforts are underway at many other schools. A <u>petition</u> circulating at Cornell University in western New York calls for all boosters to be voluntary. It requests recognizing natural immunity, and cites the obvious inability of the existing shots to prevent infection with omicron, and the well-documented injuries from Covid injections which now number over 1,000,000 according to the federal Vaccine Adverse Event Reporting System as reasons for voluntary, not coerced, boosters.

Petitions are also active at the <u>University of Delaware</u>, <u>New York University</u>, <u>University of California</u>, <u>University of Massachusetts</u>, <u>Villanova</u>, and the <u>University of Virginia</u>.
